## Heroes side by side in life and in death

Memorial in Pontiac honors state police officers, firefighters who have died in line of duty since 1864.

PONTIAC - Workers are putting the final touches on a memorial to honor Michigan's police officers and firefighters who have died in the line of duty.

The Michigan Fallen Heroes Memorial - which includes a life-size bronze statute of a police officer and firefighter kneeling side by side before a wall listing those who have died - will be unveiled at 1 p.m. Nov. 21 at its new location on the east side of north Telegraph in the Oakland County government complex.

A smaller memorial site was dedicated elsewhere in the complex in 2002.
